Also at the meeting the Fair Pair, Bonnie Pizzorno and Pam Cataletto, will provide an update on the Fair.



About a month after 9/11, workers at the World Trade Center site spotted a live pear tree (Pyrus calleryana) branch sticking out of the rubble. What was left of the formerly eight-foot tree was rescued and taken to the Arthur Ross Nursery in the Bronx's Van Cortlandt Park, where it grew to 35 feet tall.

As part of the Survivor Tree Seedling Program, three communities are selected annually to receive seedlings for the creation of their own Survivor Tree Memorial, an idea originally conceived by Mayor Michael Bloomberg.

The East Hampton tree was planted in July 2016, on the anniversary of Karen Denise Rickenbach's death.

Searching for Answers

Recently I was notified by a landscape crew that they had uncovered a deeply buried memorial tree plaque near the Dayton/Ritz building on Main Street. The inscription read, "MEMORIAL TREE, E.S. Boughton, 1938." Unfortunately, the cement monument was severely damaged. LVIS ordered a new plaque.

We did not have that plaque listed in our LVIS tree plaque database, but we did have one for Welby Boughton 1937 located at 180 Newtown Lane. I wondered if E.S. Boughton was related to Welby Boughton and what was their East Hampton connection?

I contacted Nancy Vermandois, LVIS Archives
Chair, who discovered that E.S. Boughton was the owner and editor of The East Hampton Star until his death in 1916. She contacted Andrea Meyer, research director of the East Hampton Library, who continued to research the Boughton family. Subsequently, in January 2024 the library published an article which appeared in the East Hampton Star regarding Mrs. E.S. Boughton. Nancy Vermandois wanted to learn more.

Edward Smith (E. S.) Boughton moved to East Hampton in 1890 from Danbury, Conn. As editor he advocated several times for the formation of an organization that would take on the task to "Keep East Hampton Beautiful." So as it turns out, E.S. is one of our founding fathers, and his wife, Bertha Emeline Welby Boughton is one of our first ladies. E. S. and Bertha lived with their eight children on Newtown Lane, adjacent to Wittendales. After his death, Ber-

tha continued to publish The Star; her son, Welby, became its editor until his death in 1934. The Star was then sold to Arnold Rattray in 1935.

Clara Wolfert was another of their children. Ironically, Clara's son, Jay Wolfert. was a classmate of mine and Jay's sister is our own LVIS member, Linda Brown. Linda grew up in the original Boughton family home at 180 Newtown Lane.

The house was eventually sold in the late 80s and "moved" to Dayton Lane Extension/Toilsome. The house has recently been torn down and is being replaced with a large two -story shingled home.

The obituary in The East Hampton Star of Bertha is a fascinating and an insightful recollection of this remarkable lady. She was not only a charter member of the LVIS in 1895, she was also an active member of the Ramblers Literary Society.

Bertha E. Boughton contributed over 15 recipes to LVIS Cookbooks from 1908 to 1939 (available in the LVIS Archives room). She served on the Cookbook, Fair and Parade committees.

The headstones of 13 Boughton family members can be seen on a visit to Cedar Lawn Cemetery. The most recent family member to be buried in the Boughton plots was Constance who died in 2007.

Although we can't be sure whether the plaque honored one or both of the Boughtons or even the entire family, it is clear the family made substantial contributions to East Hampton.
