On the April Agenda: LVIS and Town Pond

LVIS member Bess Rattray will discuss LVIS's long involvement with East Hampton's iconic Town Pond at the April member meeting. Bess is a thirteenth-generation East Hamptonite. She writes the column The Shipwreck Rose for The East Hampton Star and for nearly two dec-



ades before that she was a senior editor at Vogue. She has also been, in recent years, editor-in-chief of The Star's regional magazine, EAST. When off-duty, she has taken on various volunteer roles, including five years as an E.M.T. with the East Hampton Village Ambulance Association; five as the first female captain in a fire department in rural Nova Scotia; and, currently, is proud to be the founder and chairwoman of the Anchor Society of East Hampton, a nonprofit community group dedicated to fostering commerce that serves the community.

Volunteers on Gates are being instructed to strictly enforce the 10 a.m. opening, perhaps using the nearby church bells to signal the start of the Fair.




Signs

Beneath the Branches

Minding the Trees

— from a March 14 East Hampton Star Editorial

Considering the state of the trees on the South Fork, lately, it has felt rather as if we've been in the midst of some sort of arboreal apocalypse. Note: the frankly rather hellish state of some areas of Northwest Woods (the woods that aren't worthy of the name any longer, in some corners, following a beetle infestation brought here by climate change). See also the recent hue and cry over tree preservation in Sag Harbor, and recent headlines about blight on Napeague and beech trees under disease threat, as well. Trees are a hot topic in 2024.

Is all of this merely ecological coincidence? Absolutely not. Global warming, which brings new insects and diseases, is showing its devastating hand. And anyone who has been observing the trees for more than a few years understands that overdevelopment and clear-cutting have gone beyond an environmentally safe tipping point.

And that's why we thank heaven for the Ladies Village Improvement Society. If it weren't for more than a century and a quarter of the L.V.I.S. tree committee's well-informed and well-researched guardianship, we wouldn't have the leafy canopy overhead here in the village, even though we had to bid farewell to some of our old friends last month. It's not just that the L.V.I.S. has preserved the elm here in the village — the elm being the symbol of both the women's civic organization itself and of our community — it's that their care has no doubt prevented further onward spread of blight and disease.

When the leaves come out in the trees this spring, in April and May, look up. We can no longer afford to take our trees for granted. We call them "sentinels" — guardians who keep watch over our town. Pay heed. They are raising their branches in alarm.

Beech Leaf Disease Research at East Hampton High School







Trees in East Hampton are facing multiple threats, all of them of great concern to residents and the LVIS Tree Committee. One of the more recent threats is Beech leaf disease. Damage can be spotted across the East End to both the copper beech and the American beech.

Research is ongoing, but at this time there is no specific treatment for trees that are infected. Margery Daughtrey, a plant pathologist at Cornell University's Long Island Horticultural Research and Extension Center and an advisor to both the LVIS Tree and Grounds Committees, was recently interviewed by NBC regarding the disease and the search for an effective treatment. "There is some momentum building," she said, "which I hope will lead to more research and more answers."

Another person who has BLD on his radar is EHHS sophomore Griffin Beckman, who last spring was introduced to LVIS Tree Committee Chair Olivia Brooks by Dr. Stephanie Forsberg, a teacher in the Methods and Research program at the school and an LVIS member. Griffin was interested in tree research for his Advanced Placement science class and Olivia discussed the ravages of BLD with him, suggesting the names of experts in the field who might be of assistance.

Fast Forward to this April and the Science Research Symposium at the high school, where Griffin will be discussing his research: "The effect of Beech leaf disease on gas exchange in Fagus grandifolia (American Beech)". He has invited Olivia and members of the Tree Committee to attend the event, which is open to the public and takes place on April 11 at 6 p.m. at the high school.

Committee Chairs

Landmarks Project

The Board approved proceeding with a Landmarks Committee proposal to hire Sarah Kautz to conduct a study which could lead to an update to the 1982 LVIS publication "East Hampton's Heritage: An Illustrated Architectural Record". Her goal will be to identify at least 50 previously undocumented structures in the Village of East Hampton for possible

inclusion in the updated book. This is phase one of the project; the decision as to whether to proceed with the update will be made after phase one is completed.

Gardiner Brown Work

A number of house improvements took place during the February closing:

- The hardwood floors were cleaned.
- The Barn & Annex have new speckled epoxy floors.
- A new HVAC was installed in the Barn
- The Annex was painted.
- The shelves in Housewares and Men's were cleaned and painted by sales staff member Jesse Gurtler.
- A new industrial desk was added to Housewares.
- The glass top on the Baker elm desk in Books was replaced.
- A bid was accepted to re-

place a section of the historic front fence damaged by a fallen tree limb.

Nature Trail

At the request of the Nature Trail Committee, the LVIS Board wrote a letter to the Village supporting the installation of two speed bumps on Davids Lane near the Nature Trail to protect the wildlife that congregate there.


